

He became a Master Carpenter, equipment operator and truck driver. Scott worked and lived with me for a time before starting his Trucking business in Las Vegas. He was unequivocally, one of the best employees that I have employed during my forty years in business.

Scott was not only a good worker. He was friendly, helpful, fun loving, and outgoing. He was a good Father and Grandfather. He loved his daughters, his granddaughter, his parents and his brothers.

His murder was as senseless, cold blooded, evil act that was perpetrated in the most violent manner. How any human being could shoot two men in cold blood, then suffocate them and take them to the desert and bury them, while they were possibly alive, is beyond comprehension. To deliberately take someone's life is the most vial and horrendous crime there is. The Law of Compensation, God's Law, Karmic Law, every Civil and Religious Law calls for like punishment for like crime. Why Richard Hinger and Marnie Peot were not put to death for this terrible unconscionable act is only due to the injustice in our liberal system of justice. The possibility of parole for these people should not even be considered.
